Proposals are due by **January 15, 2020** (*extended from December 26*) and a selection will be made by mid-February. Applicants are encouraged to consider how they will draw on this year's theme in their application:

קומי תזע'י מי'תוך ההפכה (Kumi tze'i mi'toch ha'hafecha) – *Get up, go out from amidst the upheaval.*

About the Cause Your Project Will Address [No more than 200 words.]

1. What is the title of your proposed project? (We'll use this as a headline to announce your project to the community.)
2. What social justice cause or theme is the focus of your project? Why do you think it is meaningful and important for the NHC community to learn about and act on this issue?

About You [No more than 500 words.]

1. What is your experience or background (professional or volunteer) with the social justice issue your project will address?
2. What resources, knowledge, and skills do you bring to this project that will make it effective?
3. Give an example or two of a successful social justice project you have worked on and describe your role in making it successful. (We encourage you to submit examples of materials you have prepared for similar activities as an appendix.)
4. Have you taught or led an activity at the NHC Institute or similar retreats in the past? If so, tell us about the most relevant and recent example and what you took from the experience.

The Project Format and Design [No more than 1000 words.]

Please submit descriptions of each planned session, totalling three to four hours of programming. Some examples of slots this program could fit into include day time workshops, community-wide programs (in consultation with the Summer Institute Core Team), late-night programs, and programs geared towards specific demographics (e.g, Kids Camp, Zeitler Fellows). Programming is not limited to these slots, however. We encourage you to be in touch with past participants to get a sense of the schedule of the week and where you would best fit in.

For each proposed session, describe:

1. The intended participants
2. The goals of the session: the learning and action-oriented work
3. The content and modes of engagement (Fellows are encouraged to employ a broad variety of educational techniques, avoiding frontal lecture as much as possible in favor of interactions that engage participants.)
4. Any resources will you need to carry out this program

1. How will you know if your project was successful?
2. How can the issue be brought back to participants' home communities or networks of communities, and/or help inform NHC policies and practices?
